The memorial plaque to Al Reay has now been made (see above) and will be erected at the edge of the Pony Field. As A&B Councillor responsible for the Duchess Wood Local Nature Reserve, Al did a great deal to support and enhance Duchess Wood. A rowan tree was planted by his widow, Liz, in his memory and the plaque shown above is being put in place beside the tree by FODW.

News in brief

FODW now has somewhere to store equipment and materials.

We have rented (at a preferential rate) a place to store equipment and materials. Among the equipment is a hand-pulled trolley on which logs and other heavier items can be moved.

Logs for sale soon. FODW is starting to store logs from fallen trees and branches. It will make these available for sale when they have dried out.

Zombies and other events. Members may have noticed that there has been an increase in the number of externally-organised events in the Wood. This follows a policy decision by the Argyll and Bute Council's Duchess Wood Local Nature Reserve Committee. New rules have been drawn up to control the number and nature of these events.

Outdoor nursery. In our last newsletter we informed you about the possibility of an outdoor, year-round nursery school in part of Duchess Wood. We have now heard that the organisation, Stramash, is looking for an alternative Helensburgh site.



STORM DAMAGE

The winds were not as damaging to Duchess Wood this winter as they were in the previous year. But a few trees did come down. As always, our first priority was making the paths accessible and safe, and then clearing debris. Thanks to A&B Council (see above) and FODW volunteers for swift action.

DUCHESS WOOD and CASTLE WOOD

Presentation by Fiona Baker



Those who attended the AGM of the Friends of Duchess Wood last October will testify to the fascinating talk by Fiona Baker, local archaeologist. Space only allows a few key points here, but anyone wanting the full text, please contact our secretary.

The woods were part of the grounds of Ardencaple Castle, of the Clan MacAulay. First mentioned in 1296, enlarged in 1566, with a designed landscape added in the 18th century, it was sold to the Colquhouns of Luss in 1752. The name Castle Wood derives from the castle, but why Duchess Wood? Almost certainly after Dowager Duchess of Argyll, Ann Campbell, who lived there after her husband's death. She probably did much to improve the Wood. The castle was demolished in 1957, but thankfully Duchess Wood remains today for us to enjoy.

The 1860 OS map (above) shows no Rhu Road Higher, while the now playing fields were then farm land. The Ha Ha wall north of the Pony Field probably kept in cattle. The eastern footpath ran down to the sea and most of the paths remain today.

There is much more in Fiona's paper, including the weir at the south-west corner, an old mill, a pattern of dykes, canalisation of burns in places – but you should read the whole paper. A big thank you to Fiona for a very special illustrated talk.

FOCUS ON BRIDGES

FODW has a policy to replace wooden bridges gradually over time. The Thurgood Bridge (see far left below) is robust and even withstood a tree falling on it in a storm. But some other wooden bridges are showing signs of wear. It is our intention to replace them one-by-one with large culverts encased in stonework – see north-western bridge below, centre.

Next on our list for replacement will be the small bridge to the west of the Pony Field (see right). The present wooden structure was only intended as a temporary replacement to a previously damaged bridge.



The stone bridge on the eastern path (see photo right) was constructed in Victorian times and shows the wisdom of that construction



The steps to the Thurgood Bridge at the north-east corner of Duchess Wood are being renewed, thanks to the Community Payback Team. Previous subsidence of the soil-based steps is being replaced with a pebble sub-structure to allow drainage and a whin dust top surface, while the retaining boards are being renewed. Each board will have a top slat which can easily be replaced with wear.

The bridge is named after Ferdie Thurgood who loved to walk the hills behind Helensburgh. On his death, his executors offered a bequest to the Green Belt Group which advised that a better home for the money would be with the Access Trust which used it for the bridge.
